The calendar says spring but Mother Nature doesn't seem to be on board with that 100%. I'm hopeful nicer weather arrives in time for the various spring activities planned in Warner. Thank you to all who attended Town Meeting and engaged in conversation about various items of interest. As you can probably imagine, we're keeping a close eye on the State budget and have been active in expressing our concerns over any downshifting which may result from budget cuts. Currently, there is a danger of incurring downshifting of expenses in retirement, education and social services.

As we move forward with 2011, there are various subject that will be discussed and researched on the Selectmen level including the planning of future road maintenance, creating a new and updated website, energy audit recommendations and community composting.

Those of you who travel through the center of town have probably noticed that the structure has been removed from the parcel of property that was purchased for a future fire station. Thank you to the Highway Department crew for handling that job and making the site look fantastic! Moving forward the Selectmen will continue to work with the Fire Department and our engineer to evaluate the site and work on preliminary plans for a station.

Matthew Waite took over the helm at the Highway Department as of January 1st since Allan Brown retired in December. We did talk Allan into being on our oncall plow list at least for this season. With the passing of the torch came a month full of high accumulation snowstorms. Nothing like being broken in with back to back snowstorms, equipment issues that come along with storms and two full-time staff members being out for a good portion of that time. Along with a new Director, the Department also has a new Foreman, Tim Allen. Tim is a very familiar name and face around here and we're happy to have him as an addition to our staff.

As you do spring cleaning around your property, please remember that worn out flags can be dropped off at the Town Hall or the American Legion. If you come across any items that you want to dispose of but are not sure if there is a fee involved, feel free to call the Transfer Station ahead of time and ask. If you live on a well traveled road and have an item or piece of furniture you no longer need, try placing it on your lawn with a "FREE" sign and someone else will probably grab it for their use.

We've had a very good response this year from people wanting to volunteer for the various committees in Town. It's always nice to have new faces and fresh ideas so if you're interested in volunteering, please feel free to contact the Selectmen's Office to find out what positions are still open. We would love to have you!

Spring is finally here as we begin to see activity in the Land Use Office pick up a bit lately.

We were very pleased that all five (5) zoning articles included on the ballot for the Town Meeting were adopted. Thanks to those who supported them.

Committees within the Board are working on a number of items that need review and possibly some changes. Site Plan Review Regulations need a bit of an overhaul to ensure all definitions and regulations are presented correctly and follow the formats and definitions used in other Town ordinances and regulations.

As we move into April, the Town Master Plan update is in its final draft stage. We have been working closely with staff at the Central NH Regional Planning Commission to get this very important job done. We will give notice and conduct a public hearing to present the draft and gain public input very soon, before finalizing the project.

From the Energy Committee

In light of a difficult economy, increasing heating fuel prices, and cutbacks in fuel assistance programs, the Warner Energy Committee is moving to establish a permanent community firewood reserve.

The "wood-bank" concept has recently proven its value in other nearby towns. Free firewood is made available in limited quantities to residents in crisis or temporary need. This winter unfortunately revealed that we have such emergencies in our town too.

Success will depend on donations of firewood, volunteer labor to cut, split, and stack a centrally located supply of seasoned fuel, and people with suitable vehicles to distribute it when necessary. It is also a great opportunity to mutually 'build community' and enjoy cheerful outdoor work alongside friends and neighbors.

Our first priority is to locate and accept donations of suitable fuel wood logs as soon as possible, then coordinate groups or individuals willing to help process the wood before next winter. From Transfer Station & Recycling Center

When cleaning up the yard and garden this spring please dispose of compostable material at the compost pile rather than the compactor or burn pile. This saves the Town money and creates a beneficial product for reuse.

Please place brush and clean sawn lumber only in the burn pile. Treated and painted lumber and materials like plywood and chipboard cannot be burned. Pizza boxes can be recycled only if they are clean. Greasy box bottoms go into the trash but clean box tops can be placed with the cardboard for recycling. You can also bring any mercury containing device such as compact fluorescent bulbs and thermostats to the attendants for safe disposal. It is unlawful to place such items in the trash.

Thank you for recycling. Your efforts in 2010 generated \$37,407.39 in revenue and significant savings to the town all of which helps reduce our taxes.

From the Highway Department

Class V roads have been posted to a 6-ton weight limit including the load. Special permits can be obtained by contacting the Director of Public Works, Matt Waite at 456-3366. All Class VI roads are closed to wheeled vehicles from April 1 to May 1.

DOG LICENSES (RSA 466): All dogs 4 months old and older must be licensed by April 30th of every year. You may license your dog/dogs through the mail with up-

to-date rabies information and neutering/ spaying certificate if not on file with the Town. Include a self-addressed-stamped-return envelope & payment to:

Fees

\$ 2.00 - 1st dog for owners 65 yrs or older (additional dogs, regular fee) \$ 6.50 - 4-7 months old

\$ 6.50 - Over 7 months & spayed/altered
\$ 9.00 - Over 7 months & not spayed/altered
\$20.00 - Group (5 dogs or more)
Penalties

- ✤ \$1 per dog, per month, after May 31.
- \$25 civil forfeiture fine to follow if owner is not in compliance according to State Law.
- Past amounts outstanding carry over.

From the Building Inspector

Permits are required and must be obtained by the property owner or authorized agent who intends to construct, enlarge, alter, repair, move, demolish, change the occupancy or uses of a building or structure. Also permits are required to erect, enlarge, alter, repair, remove, convert, or replace any electrical (service panels, solar systems, outlet, lighting fixtures etc.), mechanical systems or plumbing (heating system, water heaters, water and drain lines, etc.). The installation is regulated by the State Building Code, RSA 155-A.

8:00 a.m. - Legion Members, other Veterans, Boy Scouts and the Marching Band assemble for the parade at the Legion Hall on Kearsarge Street Extension.

8:30 a.m. - Parade begins accompanied by the Kearsarge Regional High School Band. Marching units will cross Main Street onto Kearsarge Mtn. Road and stop at the monument.

8:50 a.m. - The Legion Unit, along with Boy Scouts will conduct a Flag Raising Ceremony on the Town Hall lawn. The Band will play "To the Colors."

9:00 a.m. - Legion Detail with colors enters the Town Hall, followed by the general public, to attend the program.

9:30 a.m. - After the program, all units form to resume the parade outside the Town Hall. The parade marches on West Main Street to the Pine Grove Cemetery. (Approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ mile)

10:00 a.m. - Legion Unit will conduct a brief ceremony and a salute to departed veterans at the Pine Grove Cemetery.

10:15 a.m. - Parade continues traveling out through the rear exit road of the cemetery to the bridge over the Warner River on North Village Road for a brief ceremony saluting veterans lost at sea.

 $10{:}25~{\rm a.m.}$ - Return march via Mill Street & West Main Street to the Legion Hall.

10:30 a.m. - Parade reaches the Legion Hall and all participants are dismissed.
