GREETINGS!

Each Spring, towns throughout New England hold Town Meetings to elect officials and vote on the town budget. This is a New England tradition not widely seen in other parts of the country.

Warner's Annual Town Meeting begins with voting on Tuesday March 10, 2020 from 7am to 7pm where registered voters elect the Town Officers. For a complete list of candidates, visit warner.nh.us. This year, all candidates are running unopposed. However, the votes are still counted so candidates can see the amount of support they receive for their new role. Also on Tuesday, you are voting on the KRSD School Warrant and a proposed amendment to the Town Zoning Ordinance.

After voting, enjoy a good night's sleep because you may be up late for the continuation of Town Meeting on Wednesday night starting at 6pm.

Why should you attend Town Meeting? Because it provides an opportunity to learn about projects on which the town has spent tax dollars, you vote on the annual budget, and you decide where funds should be allocated. Why does this matter? Because the money comes from you, the taxpayer.

The Warner tax rate is comprised of the KRSD school tax, the county tax (set at the Merrimack County Delegation), the state education tax, and the town's municipal budget which is presented and voted upon at Town Meeting. This year's proposed municipal budget will be presented by Budget Committee Chair Mike Cutting. Prior to voting on the budget, residents will be able to ask questions of the committee, the Selectboard, and department heads. Town meeting is regulated by moderator, Ray Martin who will call on attendees who raise their hand to speak. **Everyone has the opportunity to speak.**

Building the budget involves months of work prior to Town Meeting. Department heads submitted their budgets to the Selectboard where they were combined into one budget for review. Changes were recommended, the Selectmen's budget was approved and it was submitted to the Budget Committee. This group of residents then reviewed, edited, and approved the final proposed budget which will be presented at Town Meeting. This year, the Budget Committee reduced the Selectmen's budget by \$12,750.

Leading up to Town Meeting, there were many public meetings and hearings to determine what is presented to the taxpayers. For anyone who did not attend public hearings on the budget, you have another opportunity to be heard at Town Meeting.

Warner has roughly 2100 registered voters who can participate at Town Meeting. Historically, only 10% of registered voters attend the meeting and make key financial decisions for the Town. We hope to see you there.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT—DIRECTOR, TIM ALLEN

I am grateful to the highway staff for their dedication this past year and to the Town of Warner for your support. We had a very icy year. As a result, now you will see the street sweepers cleaning the winter sand and salt.

In addition to improving and maintaining the highways and byways of Warner, we oversee the historic buildings that require regular maintenance. In the coming year, we will fix the sidewalk around the library and upgrade the recently vacated Town Hall office (due to the Assessing and Land Use offices combining into one office). Upgrades to the front yard at the Town Hall and gardening the roundabout balance the not-so-pretty job of keeping the roads clear with the beautification projects of Warner.

At Town Meeting, you will be voting on a Warrant Article for funds to put in capital reserve for the purchase of a new truck. With that vehicle we start the process of scheduled upgrades for our current fleet.

I will continue to strive to work on behalf of the residents of Warner and look forward to seeing everyone at Town Meeting where I will be available to answer questions.

WARNER VILLAGE WATER DISTRICT —DIRECTOR, RAY MARTIN

AIR BUBBLES IN THE WATER

The District has two gravel packed wells from which it draws water to supply the District, the oldest of the wells is not able to keep up with flows necessary to meet the District's demand. Air bubbles you may have noticed in the water are an indication of this problem when the pump cavitates, this allows air to be introduced to the system. The air bubbles disappear within 15-20 seconds after the tap is opened and a glass is filled. The air bubbles also disappear when the District switches to Well #2

The water quality is not affected by the air bubbles and, as always, the water is tested daily and it meets all quality standards.

The Commissioners are pursuing long-term solutions to the problem, such as siting new back-up well and installing sophisticated well management controls. Early this Spring, the District will be installing variable speed pump controls to determine if the new controls will help eliminate the air bubble problem.
